# **Native American Students in Higher Education**

#### **CENSUS OVERVIEW**

According to the Census' American Community Survey, in  $2021 \, \underline{1\%}$  of the total U.S. population identified as American Indian or Alaskan Native. Among American Indian or Alaskan Native residents aged 25 or over, only  $\underline{15.4\%}$  had earned a bachelor's degree or higher. This rate is up from  $\underline{13.4\%}$  in 2010, but falls short of the national rate of  $\underline{32.9\%}$ .

# **ENROLLMENT**

- In Fall 2020, Native American students made up 0.6% of all postsecondary enrollment.
- In 2020, 22% of the 18–24-year-old Native American population were <u>enrolled</u> in college compared to 40% of the overall U.S. population.
- Since Fall 2010, Native American enrollment has declined from 196,000 to 123,000, a 37% decrease:
  - o Undergraduate enrollment declined from 179,000 to 107,000, a 40% decrease
  - o Graduate enrollment declined from 17,000 to 14,000, a nearly 18% decrease
- Native American students are much more likely to <u>attend</u> public versus private institutions of higher education.
  - o In Fall 2020, 83% of Native American students attended public institutions:
    - 45% attended public four-year institutions
    - 38% attended public two-year institutions
- Nearly 80% of the Fall 2020 enrollment at Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCU) were Native American students.

# **FINANCIAL AID**

- According to the National Postsecondary Student Aid Survey, <u>64%</u> of Native American students received some form of federal Title IV financial aid in the 2017-18 academic year, compared to 59% of all students.
  - 53% of Native American students received a Pell grant, compared to 44% of all students.
  - o 39% of Native American students received a federal student loan, a similar share compared to all students.
- Among Native American students who received federal Title IV aid, the <u>average amount</u> received was \$7,962, which is the lowest of any racial/ethnic group.
  - o The average Pell grant amount for Native American students was \$3,649.
  - The average Federal student loan amount for Native American students was \$7,654.

# COMPLETION/DEGREE ATTAINMENT

- 42% of first-time, full-time Native American students attending four-year institutions beginning in 2014 graduated within six years, compared to 64% for all students.
- At two-year institutions, Native American students tend to graduate within three years at a similar rate as other racial/ethnic groups, 30% for Native American students compared to 34% overall.
- Of the more than two million <u>bachelor's degrees</u> conferred in the 2019-20 academic year, 9,151 (0.4%) went to Native American students.

#### **EARNINGS AND WEALTH**

- According to the Baccalaureate & Beyond study, ten years after receiving a bachelor's degree,
  Native American graduates who reported having an income averaged a gross income of \$76,602,
  similar to the national average of \$76,370.
- Wealth accumulation can be <u>measured</u> differently from income. Ten years after graduating:
  - 70% of Native American graduates reported owning a home, compared to 63% of all graduates
  - 84% of Native American graduates had some form of a retirement account, similar to the 87% of all graduates

### POPULATION-SPECIFIC CONSIDERATIONS

- Native American students are <u>often excluded</u> from postsecondary data and research due to their small sample size.
- Native American students are less likely to enroll in <u>Advanced Placement</u> or <u>college</u> prep courses in high school.
- Native American students are also less likely to have family members that have attended college.
  - o In 2021, 24% of Native American <u>children</u> under 18 years of age lived in a household with a parent who completed a bachelor's degree or higher compared to 59% of white children.
  - Native American children were the least likely out of all racial/ethnic groups to live in a household with a parent who has a bachelor's degree or higher.
